

FIVE EVENTS TO TAKE PLACE ACROSS WALTHAM FOREST AS PART OF THE ROYAL COURT'S LISTEN LOCAL

Today the Royal Court Theatre announced *Listen Local: The Performances*, a series of free events taking place across Waltham Forest as part of the Mayor's London Borough of Culture 2019. *Listen Local: The Performances* has been created by community groups, young people, Waltham Forest residents and local artists, in collaboration with the Royal Court Theatre.

Taking place across two weekends in September, the five performances, will incorporate sport, storytelling, dance, theatre, music and visual art. Each event will take place at a different location across the borough and will include; a film installation in the vibrant community hub of Chingford Mount; South Asian songs performed around the iconic fountain of Waltham Forest Town Hall; an interactive experience along the streets of the Bakers Arms area inspired



by the journey of a young person in Waltham Forest and a community theatre performance on a Routemaster bus.

The Performances are the final phase of *Listen Local*, a year-long collaboration between the Royal Court Theatre, The National Trust and communities in Waltham Forest. Previous phases of the project have included; film competition **See the Real**, the **Mini Forest Cinema**; and a series of workshops led by professional artists focusing on writing, performance and design.

Listen Local was commissioned as part of Waltham Forest London Borough of Culture 2019 with support from the Airbnb Community Tourism Programme.

Listen Local: The Performances:

Monumental Citizens

Chingford Mount, South Chingford, E4 6SH

The short films will run continuously on a loop for the duration

Three of the borough's young filmmakers, Emmanuel Li, Naomi Soneye-Thomas and Lamar Harper will collaborate with selected 'Monumental Citizens' – local citizens identified by community leader Satvinder Cubb as being an integral part of the fabric of South Chingford – to create a series of short films. Using these films, designer Bahbak Hashemi-Nezhad will create an interactive film installation on Chingford Mount activating the civil architecture of the space. Chingford Mount is a vibrant hub used by many different people in the community. Two of the filmmakers previously took part in *See the Real*, the first phase of Listen Local earlier in the year. The Mini Forest Cinema's visit to Chingford Mount provided the inspiration for this piece.

The Fountain Stage

The iconic fountain at Waltham Forest Town Hall will be transformed for a performance that retells the stories of popular South Asian songs through the medium of live music, performance and illustration. The idea came from a meeting with a community group of male South Asian Elders including music promoter Fazal Hussein.

The audience will be guided through a booklet produced in collaboration with illustrator Aleesha Nandhra, playwright Emteaz Hussain and women from the South Asian Community. The illustrations will take a contemporary slant on the classic films songs. Audiences will be invited to sit around the edge of the fountain and watch the performance.



Director Milli Bhatia, whose recent work includes *seven methods of killing kylie jenner* at the Royal Court Theatre; will work with the band, singer and performers.

Intercept – The Street Challenge combines sport and dance in an interactive performance. A local choreographer will be collaborating with a young writer from youth engagement group Street Base, and sports groups in the borough to combine dance, sport and storytelling to create an interactive experience about the journey of a young person in Waltham Forest. The interactive experience, which will unfold along streets in the Bakers Arms area, will see audience members working in groups to take on a street challenge to complete the experience.

Breathing Space

Breathing Space is a trail around the park where audiences will discover bold celebrations of the daily triumphs we all share. The audience will discover pop up performances including a 5 minute play written by members of the Listen Local writing group, a performance of a piece composed especially for the project by WAVE Choir and an act based on escapology.

Breathing Space is inspired by conversations with Waltham Forest Hearing Voices Group and Waltham Forest Bipolar Group from Harmony Hall. Harmony Hall is a vital community resource which is currently under threat of closure.

Free - due to the nature of the space, tickets for each performance will be limited. Tickets will be issued on a first come, first served basis 20 minutes before the start time. Maximum of 2 per person.

As part of the second phase of *Listen Local*, the Royal Court led workshops over three months in writing, performance and design. From these groups, a community company





evolved of 11-70-year olds. This company will create and perform a new play around a vintage Routemaster bus directed by Royal Court Associate Director Hamish Pirie.

The Mayor's London Borough of Culture Award

The London Borough of Culture award is a major new initiative launched by the Mayor of London in June 2017 and inspired by the UK City and European Capital of Culture programmes. The Mayor's London Borough of Culture award brings Londoners together. Putting culture at the heart of local communities, where it belongs. Shining a light on the character and diversity of London's boroughs and showing culture is for everyone. Now more than ever, the Mayor wants Londoners to get to know each other and feel part of our great city. Thanks to this new award, all Londoners will now have the chance to be part of something extraordinary.

In total, 22 boroughs bid for £1million funding to stage a year-long programme of cultural events and initiatives, and to develop a plan to make culture an integral part of the borough's future. Waltham Forest will be London Borough of Culture in 2019 and Brent will be London Borough of Culture in 2020. A panel of experts and City Hall officers read and moderated the bids. Experts were from institutions including City Bridge Trust, Historic England, Arts Council England, Paul Hamlyn Foundation, Heritage Lottery Fund and the City of London. Recommendations were made to the Deputy Mayor for Culture and the Creative Industries, Justine Simons OBE and the Mayor, Sadiq Khan, who made the final decision.



The winning boroughs of Waltham Forest and Brent were chosen based on their artistic vision and ambition to deliver outstanding cultural initiatives in their local area, putting communities at the centre of the programme design and delivery. The successful boroughs have demonstrated how winning the title will enable them to deliver their long-term ambitions, put local people at the heart of the programme, and showcase a diverse, vibrant and inclusive programme of work.

Waltham Forest London Borough of Culture 2019

Waltham Forest is the Mayor's first London Borough of Culture. The award, the flagship programme in his culture strategy, was a major new initiative launched by Sadiq to put culture at the heart of London's communities.
